From the Pastor

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Saturday, October 12th will mark the day when we pack meals for the world's hungry as part of the Rise Against Hunger Initiative. Some of the meals that we pack will be going to feed those devastated by the category 5 hurricane in the Bahamas. There is a dire need there for food. A decade ago, Haiti was ravaged by a devastating earthquake. At that time the church I was serving in North Carolina connected with the Stop Hunger Now (Haiti) initiative, and like the Bahamas getting food to those on the ground was critical. This is our opportunity at St. John's to help make a difference in eradicating hunger in the world.

I've heard some grumbling (the Bible calls it murmuring) in the church, where people have complained that we should be doing something to "help our own people" through Phoenixville Area Community Services, rather than other people in the world. PACS is a wonderful ministry and we provide food donations monthly. We have had a pancake breakfast to raise money for PACS and we are once again a sponsor for the pottery bowl event which raises thousands and thousands of dollars for PACS. But let me point out something that was pointed out to me when I was serving in North Carolina by Stop Hunger Now (Rise Against Hunger): we have hunger in this country is true...but we do not have starvation, absolute starvation in this country. Food is available in our country from different outlets. Many people in third world countries and nations hit with natural catastrophe simply do not have access to any food.

When Jesus sat on the hillside by the sea of Galilee the people who went to hear him preach were absolutely hungry, starving by the end of the day. The disciples wanted Jesus to send them away to their own villages to buy food. Jesus commanded them, "You give them something to eat." (Mark 6:30-44) Share what you have with your neighbors, who are not even from your own town, your own family, your own tribe. 5,000 people shared a meal that day and it all began with five loaves and two fish. What all four gospels have given us in this is story, is a wonderful metaphor that represents the church's mission, the church's responsibility, to feed the hungry. This means feeding "the other" who are our neighbors, who may not be Americans, who may be of a darker skin than our own, and who may not even be Christians. "You give them something to eat" says Jesus, "do not send them away."

Won't you join me as we pack over 10,000 meals for those who are starving??

Ask Dr. Phil A special service of Dr. Philip Schaff

Dear Dr. Phil,

A church down the street from ours burned to the ground last week and all their records were destroyed. Our congregation is almost 200years old, and we'd hate to have something like that happen to our records (we'd hate to have the church burn down too!). What do you suggest? - Bob B., Consistory President

Dear Bob,

I can understand your concern. Over the centuries many church records have been lost some because the church burned, some because the congregation ceased to exist or joined another denomination. Keeping your records in a vault in the church office might make you feel a bit more secure. A large number of churches have arranged to have their records microfilmed or digitized. Then they keep a copy and deposit their original record books with the Evangelical and Reformed Historical Society. One of the nice things about having your records on microfilm or a disk is that, when genealogists ask for your help, you can give them a microcopy of their ancestors' records. You wouldn't want to put your fragile record book on the photocopy machine, would you? When a congregation is disbanded, of course, the original records should be given to the ERHS for posterity.

If you want to learn more about the care and safekeeping of yoru church's sacramental records, get in touch with the Evangelical and Reformed Historical Society, located on the second floor of the Philip Schaff Library at Lancaster Theological Seminary, 555 W. James Street, Lancaster, PA 17603. You can direct your inquires to erhs@lancasterseminary.edu or call 717-290-8734 to make an appointment for an on-site visit. Alison Mallin, our Office Manager and Archives Assistant, will be happy to help you. The library is open Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, from 9 to 4. A daily pass to do research at the ERHS Library is only \$7.00 a day. Research by mail is \$35 an hour. Donations are welcome.
